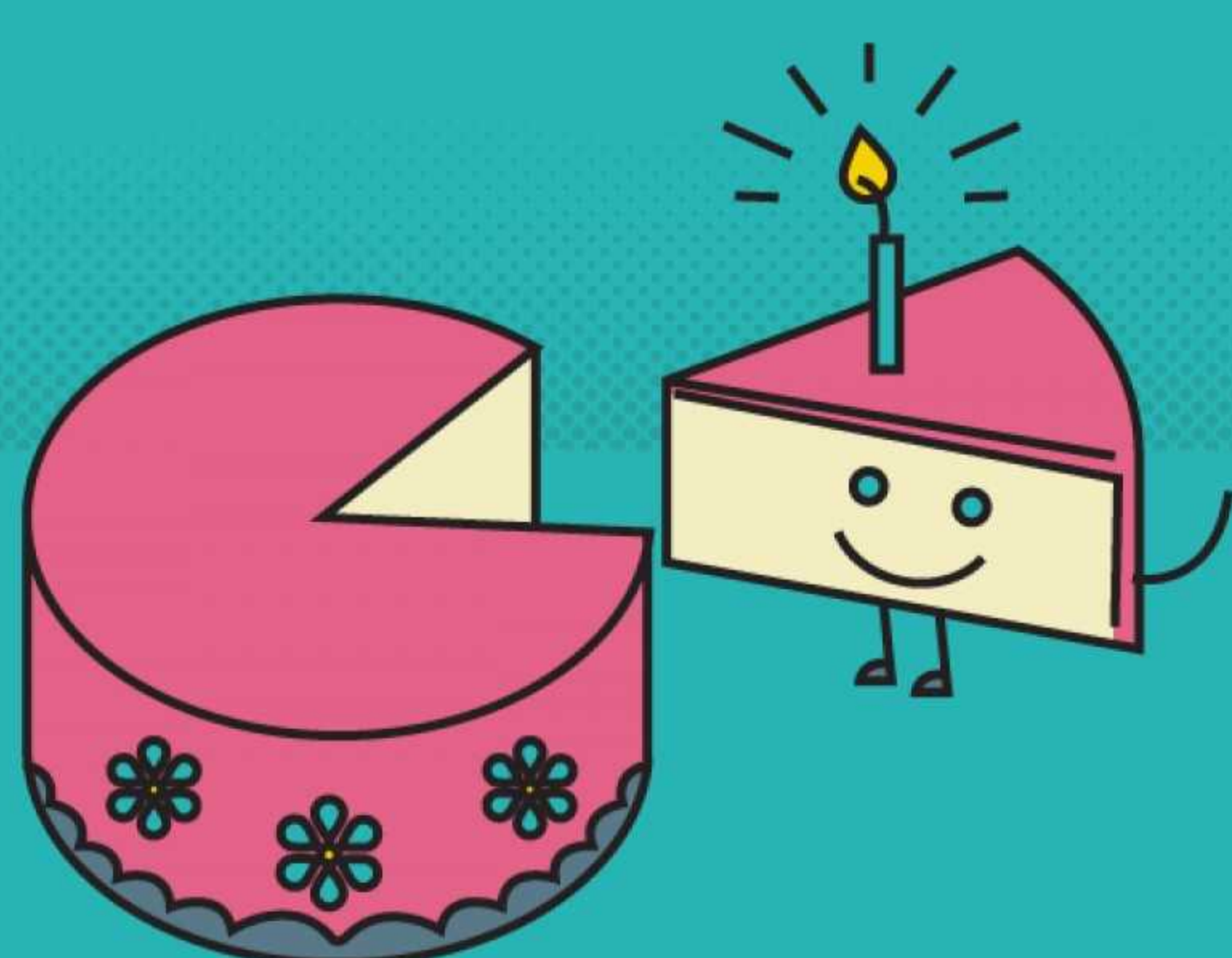


POPULAR ENGLISH IDIOMS

- "I thought that test was going to be hard, but it was a piece of cake!"

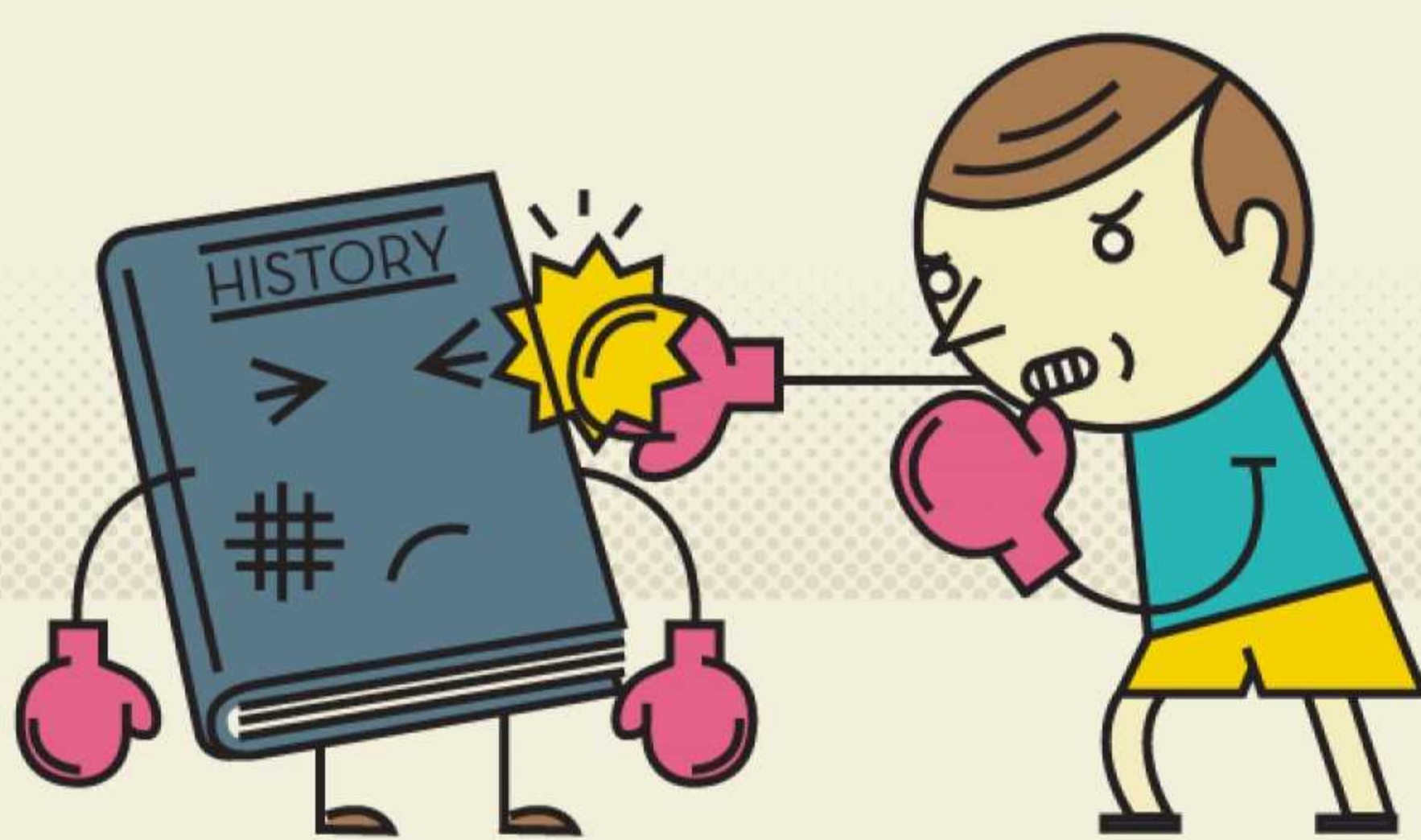
► Hit the Books

- "They got my lunch order wrong, and to add insult to injury, the food was cold!"

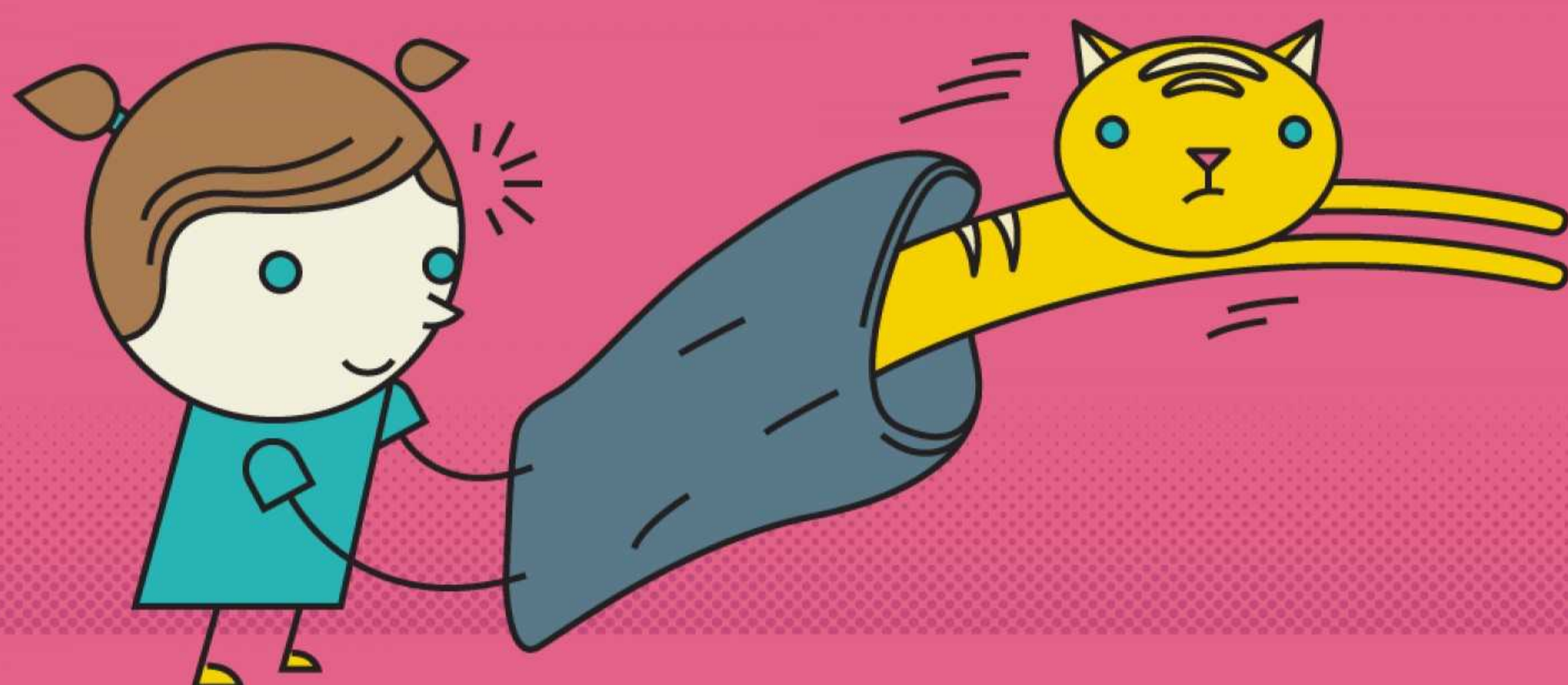
► Let the Cat Out of the Bag
